

NATIONAL NRM KNOWLEDGE CONFERENCE, DARWIN, APRIL 2010 Connecting across people and place Program

The Conference is structured around four themes:

- Building partnerships in a competitive environment
- NRM is good business for primary production
- Improving biodiversity values off-reserve
- Measuring progress resource condition

At the final session of the Conference we will seek to answer the following questions for each theme:

- What is happening now?
- What have we learnt (both good and bad)?
- How do we apply the lessons learnt?

A session Chair will be nominated for each of the four sessions. That person will be responsible coordinating the feedback from each session (from the key note speakers and from the workshops).

Workshops are a central part of the Conference – they provide the opportunity for delegates to hear, discuss and learn about various initiatives from around Australia that are contributing to the conference theme. Four 90 minute workshops will be run in parallel for three of the conference sessions.

Each workshop will be informed by several short case-study presentations (10 minutes each) at the start of each workshop and then a variety of formats will be employed to run the group discussions. This will ensure that workshops are interesting. But it was also provide a positive environment for helping delegates to increase their knowledge and for generating meaningful feedback to be shared with other delegates during the final session.
