VISITOR SAFETY GUIDE

Introduction to visitors:

- Before entering farm area visitors must report to the administration office and sign in.
- This site is a working production facility, so care must be taken at all times for your own safety and the safety of others.
- VDA is a HACCP approved fish harvesting facility and as such visitors are not permitted into the immediate vicinity of harvest operations without appropriate induction.
- Enclosed footwear, clothing that will provide protection from the weather and solar ultraviolet radiation must be worn when onsite at VDA.
- Visitors and new sub-contractors must be accompanied by a VDA employee on their first visit to the farm.
- Visitors take personal equipment onto the farm at their own risk; anything dropped in the water is irretrievable.

Safe Behaviours at VDA

- Walk, don't run
- Use handrails as provided
- Don't climb on fittings
- Do not touch equipment or machinery
- Do not throw anything into the water;
- Keep fingers and feet out of hinged areas on the system farm
- Be alert to forklift and other vehicles moving around the farm, stay clear of moving vehicles.

What to look out for:

- The floating walkways may sway, so it's best to hold on.
- The system farm deck is open mesh and can be very slippery when wet or frosty.
- Farm operations can be noisy, hearing protection is available from the administration and feed offices; Visitor groups must stay together as a group to ensure any safety instructions can be heard.
- Please take care as you walk around the farm as there may be 'trip' and overhead hazards on the walkways that have not been removed due to operational needs, e.g. ropes, hoses, winches, boxes, wires and nets.

What happens if there is an accident:

In the event of an accident visitors must leave the system farm immediately and return to the emergency muster point (located between the feed shed and the wharf), and assemble as a group for further briefing by the site manager.

What to do if you fall into the water:

- The water is very cold and moves very fast;
- Try not to panic, and concentrate on staying afloat;
- Do not swim against the tide flow;
- In a rescue situation a lifebuoy and line will be launched; VDA has a powerboat onsite that can be deployed for rescue operations. Page 8



Map: Paper Beach Launceston

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




